was stunning with virtually no wind and pleasantly mild temperatures for the time of year. However there was no significant convection due to the low sun angle and lift was hard to find so most flights were relatively brief unless you were flying with 'electric assist' on board. Rex and Sam flew their large scale gliders to great effect and it was very satisfying watching these graceful machines cruise effortlessly through the blue sky and perform perfect and accurate scale landings each time – just magic.

Saturday 16th July will be the last time we can use the Quaildale field in 2016 as the farmer requires it for grazing, so I hope to see as many members there as possible. Bring whatever you want to fly – it does not have to be a glider - as there is plenty of space for all model types. The field is well suited to large scale models with oodles of runway, safe over-shoot and under-shoot areas and almost unlimited airspace as we are outside the control zone, so come along and fly.

Last Saturday the club held a 'working bee' at Bankhouse to clean and service the tractor and tidy up the trees and grass around the edges of the field. There was a very good turnout – I counted over a dozen members - and many hands make light work so we got all the necessary chores done quickly and still had plenty of time to get in some flying, which was just as well because the weather on Sunday was dire so the planned Fun-fly had to be scrubbed.

The Fun-fly is now re-scheduled for Sunday 3rd July and I for one am really looking forward to this. It is more years than I care to remember since I last attempted to fly the limbo challenge and do a proper spot landing, where you actually have to land on the spot and not just 'somewhere on the runway'. This will be a lot of fun as well as a good way of sharpening up your flying skills – so come along and have a go!
